crack in granite counter top at corner of sink

Crack has developed only at the right front corner of the sink, 2.5 weeks after installation in a still vacant unit. A 4' level shows space beggining between the level and the rest of the sink. The slab going to the left is also loose at the seam & is unstable, moving downward when you press on it. Installer says someone stepped on it. Accumulated dust on counter top shows no sign of being stepped upon. Other surface areas will oh so slightly show movement when pressed down. Is this indications of faulty installation or should I just live with it?

If the installation is done properly it doesn't really matter if someone steps on the countertop.

It is not recommendable, of course, but occasionally nothing would happen.

The countertop must be solidly bond to the top of the cabinets and no movement should ever be allowed, let alone felt the way you can feel it!

And when everything will be done to your satisfaction…
