## How do you remove counter sealant?

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I recently applied a counter sealant to my granite and it looks horrible! It left a film with lots of streaks. How do I remove it?

Dear Jamie:

Didn&#39t you read the directions printed on the back of the bottle?... You should have removed the residue of the product from the surface of your stone before it had a chance to dry. Impregnators (a.k.a. sealers) are strictly below the surface (of the stone) products, not topical sealers.

Too late now, I&#39m afraid!...:-(

What to do?

There&#39s no sure answer, because it all depends on the make of the product. Sometimes it&#39s enough to target small areas of the counertop, sprinkle some more of the same product, and then immediately, using a clean rag and lots of elbow-grease, rub, rub, rub and rub until the old and the new are all gone. Some other times that technique does not work and you may have to resort to a potent (and allegedly highly toxic) paint stripper based on Methylene Chloride (do read every precautionary warnings printed on the container of the product if you choose that solution). I believe that your best bet is to contact the manufacturer of the product and ask them for more precise guidance.

Now remember, it's never too early to think about the proper maintenance of your stone. The issue of what you'll be doing day in and day out to your stone is far more important than its sealing (if and when possible and/or advisable; did your granite or "granite" need to be sealed??...) and it's all too often neglected. As you can tell by reading many of this site's postings, you're not likely to get good information about it from your dealer or installer. Don't become another statistic!
