My husband left a coffee cup on our new marble endtable. I tried to remove the ring with lemon juice (I read this would remove stains in a Heloise book) It made things worse. I did wipe it off immediately, but it still is noticable. I tried cleaning it with marble cleaner and marble polish, but I still can see the dull finish in that spot. Is there any thing I can do?

Dear Joy ce:

" I tried to remove the ring with lemon juice ―

Ouch!!... L

Well, since you reali z ed that's an etch-mark created by the acidity of the lemon juice, you should also reali z e that it can't be cleaned off with something inside a bottle that says  $\hat{a} \in \mathfrak{C}$  marble cleaner  $\hat{a} \in \hat{a} \in \mathbb{A}$  so-called  $\hat{a} \in \mathfrak{C}$  marble polish  $\hat{a} \in \mathbb{C}$  couldn't possibly do anything, either, for  $\hat{a} \in \mathfrak{C}$  marble-polishes  $\hat{a} \in \mathbb{C}$  are fine waxes of sorts only meant to somehow preserve and possibly enhance the original high-gloss finish  $\hat{a} \in \mathbb{C}$  not to make it. Stone is not polished by slapping a wax onto it, but mechanically, by abrasion and friction, like gemstone.

There's solution, though! J
