My only saving grace is that all my limestone (and I used several different kinds) is pretty rustic and a few stains will just blend in. Still, I want to protect it best I can. As for acid etching, since I assume that your limestones are not polished, all you will ever need are a few different grits (from 120 to 400) of good ol' metal-grade sandpaper.
